14:30 Session I: delivering higher security of gas supplies

Since 2022, the EU and Energy Community faced significant challenges due to the war in Ukraine and the subsequent energy crises. Notably, total Russian gas pipeline imports plummeted to cca 30 billion cubic meters (bcm) per year from the pre-crisis level of 155 bcm, representing just cca 8% of all EU pipeline gas imports. When the contract with Russia expires at the end of this year, the transit of gas pipelines via Ukraine will halt. The decreased reliance on Russian fossil fuels tightens the gas supply landscape in the region and as such, it is essential to secure and diversify gas routes. Equally important, we must ensure adequate gas storage ahead of winter.

The targets set by Regulation (EU) 2022/1032 (the Storage Regulation), adopted by the EU and the Energy Community, are designed to enhance supply security and ensure proper certification of storage system



operators. These legally binding targets complement the existing Security of Gas Supply Regulation (EU) 2017/1938 and amend Regulation (EC) 715/2009, addressing critical issues and strengthening the region's energy resilience.

The panel will discuss the state of play related to the gas security situation in Europe, the consequences of the Ukrainian transit halt, the need to implement of the Storage and the SoS Regulation, and the opportunity and challenges posed by the opening of other supply routes to the Energy Community region.

16:30 Session II: state of the gas market and regulatory insights

In 2023, gas demand in Europe decreased, registering a 20% decline compared to 2021. The reduction in Russian gas imports, coupled with diversification efforts and market adjustments, led to a significant drop in gas prices to around 40€//MWh, down from over 300€/MWh in the peak days of 2022. Storage levels at their historic highs also led to decreases in wholesale prices.

New LNG import terminals and additional gas transportation capacity eased the network congestions that drove price differences to record highs in 2022. The likely end of the Ukraine gas transit agreement, coupled with potentially increasing costs of cross-border trade, could disrupt regional gas balances, calling for preparedness and regional solutions. In some countries, the state has made interventions in the functioning of the market. The level of transmission tariffs when exploring new gas routes becomes essential.

This session takes stock of the current gas market developments in the EU and the Energy Community Contracting Parties, focusing on third-party access, firm capacity offers, and the effects of transmission tariff changes in the region on future gas flows.

09:05 Session III: Towards decarbonization of the gas sector - stepping up the game

The EU adopted the hydrogen and decarbonized gas market package, which will govern the gas and hydrogen sectors (including biogases, infrastructure, sustainability verification) in the future decades. The consequences will be spelled out to the natural gas and future hydrogen sectors in the Contracting Parties. The consideration of infrastructure for new gases has not yet gained momentum, which was visible during the recent process of selecting Projects of Energy Community Interest (PECI) in the Energy Community.

The Contracting Parties are committed to combating methane emissions, which should be pursued with the decarbonization agenda. Promising biomethane plans in Ukraine have been halted due to a lack of a clear framework for sustainability verification, which would enable cross-border trade and future transformation of the energy sector in Ukraine and other Contracting Parties.

11:30 Panel Debate IV: New supply and trading patterns in Central and South East Europe with improved transparency

During the gas crisis, it became evident that functioning gas markets play a substantial role in the security of supply for countries and the region. Supply patterns of underlying gas markets reoriented themselves significantly, and historical supply patterns have started to change and are continuing to change. This was reflected by increased spreads and congestion, especially in some parts of the region. The development of liquid gas exchanges, standardized trading, and clearing is reaching the Contracting Parties.
